Fall Reminder from Lisa Braugher, PT

When encountering someone who has fallen, our first impulse may be to provide physical assistance. While in the moment, it may seem to expedite the person’s recovery, it is **inadvisable**. We ask that you please respond, rather than react, to promote everyone’s safety. Well intentioned physical assistance by bystanders may be detrimental and inadvertently cause harm to the person who originally needed help as well as those helping. Instead of repositioning or lifting the person, it is helpful to:

- ✓ Remain calm and encourage the fallen person to take slow, deep breaths and relax.
- ✓ Stay with the person, as able.
- ✓ Call for assistance, as follows:
 - In a patio home/apartment: press the Aerial Alert button or dial “0” on the telephone.
 - In the lobby, dining areas, meeting rooms: report the fall to the nearest employee or reception desk, or dial “0” on a telephone.
 - On campus grounds (parking lot, sidewalk, garage): find a telephone or use your cell phone and dial “0” or 724-776-8100.
 - We would like to remind you to walk on the sidewalks when you are out in the community; please do not take shortcuts across the grass from one sidewalk to another. The grass may be wet, and you could slip and fall.

Please allow campus professionals including nursing and security staff to safely manage these situations, as per their training. The kindest and most effective way for us to help one another is to summon the appropriate staff in times of need.

Was Jaws filmed in the ocean?

Jaws was filmed in the ocean, a Hollywood first. The movie is set on the fictional island of Amity but was filmed around Martha's Vineyard in Massachusetts. Martha's Vineyard sits adjacent to the Atlantic Ocean, and Spielberg decided to shoot part of the film on location.

Were any real sharks used in the movie?

Jaws' largest and most iconic cast member, dubbed Bruce, was actually three different mechanical sharks, and for a couple of scenes, was played by a real great white. Before filming started, a crew went to Australia to capture cage-diving close-ups with a great white.

What was the mistake in Jaws?

When Hooper finds the shark tooth in the hull of Ben Gardner's boat, the point is sticking up, with the root end of the tooth embedded in the wood. If the shark had lost the tooth while biting into the hull, Hooper should have found the point stuck in the wood, with the root end exposed.
